SANDY MORRISON

Sandy is the President of International Council for Adult Education, and has served as President of Asia South Pacific Association for Basic and Adult Education. At the University of Waikato, her research focusses on adult education, education for sustainability and the application of indigenous models in addressing social, environmental and developmental issues to improve livelihoods for indigenous peoples and peoples of the Pacific.

Tony Dreise is a proud descendent of the Guumilroi and Euahlayi peoples of north-west NSW and south-west Queensland. Tony is an independent consultant who undertakes research; policy analysis; curriculum and resource development; change management; and community planning for government, community, philanthropic and education bodies. He is also an Indigenous Scholar at the Australian National University.



JOHN FALZON

Dr John Falzon, Chief Executive of the St Vincent Paul Society National Council of Australia, is a social analyst, activist and poet. He has worked in academia, community development, research and advocacy. He has written and spoken widely on the structural causes of inequality in Australia and the collective struggle for social justice and is a regular media commentator.



EDWINA MACDONALD

Edwina is Co-Director of Policy and Advocacy at the Australian Council of Social Service. She has extensive policy experience from the community sector, academia and government in local, national and global contexts. Prior to joining ACOSS, Edwina has led policy reform agendas for Women's Legal Services NSW and Australia, Kingsford Legal Centre and Australian Lawyers for Human Rights; directed research projects at UNSW's Gilbert + Tobin Centre of Public Law; and worked as a policy advisor in federal government.
